# Another Chapter

## Greg Rine has retired.

He has led the changes at Pukeiti since its transfer to the Taranaki Regional Council, in 2010, when the partnership arrangement with the Trust was established. From this has evolved the Trust's role in providing advice, particularly on the conservation and enhancement of the rhododendron collection, in accordance with the original aims of the Trust Deed. These have been the guiding principles embodied in the agreement with the TRC. Guided by these, Greg's role was to manage and give leadership to several projects designed to enhance the visitors' experiences and education, maintain the gardens' appeal, and increase visitor numbers.

Much has been done in the past twelve years. Projects have included the metalling of the major pathways; enhanced wastewater systems; refurbishment of the Gatehouse which now includes a visitor information centre, Rainforest Café and conference rooms; the reconstruction of the covered vireya walks; the tree-top walkway to the water-wheel viewing platform and the Bublitz Education Centre; the network of huts, all named for native insects which focus an education trail for children; special garden features such as the Keiller Garden , Misty Knoll, pond bridge and the installation of garden art – stone carvings and metal dragon flies, moas and Haast eagles; the well-used Piwakawaka Bush Hut and the beginning of a cycleway which will one day reach the Oakura beach. For members , probably the most important, was the replacement of The Lodge. Built on the foundations of the old Lodge and public room it includes a members' lounge, boardroom and library, a small flat and the spacious Douglas Cook Room. The Trust has a lease over The Lodge which all or parts of can be hired. Outgoings are met by the TRC.

Concurrently the TRC has undertaken a pest control regime which has allowed for the reintroduction of kiwi.

Visitor numbers as a result of all the work have increased considerably – from 10,000 in 2012 to 86,000 last year.

While the projects have absorbed enormous energy, Pukeiti's reputation of international significance remains primarily due to the gardens in their unique rainforest setting, and of course the collection of rhododendrons.

The garden staff continue to do an amazing job. Greg's departure has coincided with a number of new staff appointments: Simon Barton is the new Head Gardener, and Chris Rodriguez and Ross Gradwell join our well established team of Scott Denham, Sharn Morgan, Andrew Brooker, and Lara Coxhead.

Andrew ( part of whose salary is paid for by the Trust) is responsible for the ex-situ conservation programme at Pukeiti. Collecting and propagating cuttings and seeds of MPI approved plants, sourced throughout NZ and overseas, has been the first stage of the project. The second stage, while keeping the majority at Pukeiti, is the distribution of selected continues

species to other gardens throughout the country. Plants have been sent to Kerikeri, the Quarry Gardens in Whangarei, Eden Gardens, Heritage Park, Dunedin Botanic Garden, and Gore, the climate of each site determining the species sent. One of Andrew's roles is to monitor the distributed collection to ensure the conservation of the various clones, particularly of rare plants, and thus the species.

Greg's replacement is Stuart Robertson, an experienced plantsman and park administrator. His previous employment was with the NPDC as Manager of Parks and Open Spaces. His focus with the TRC will be to maintain and enhance the high standards of Pukeiti , Hollard Gardens and Tupare so that they remain among the top group of New Zealand gardens. Stuart leads the next chapter, and the Trust looks forward to working with him.

# From the Members' Committee

Nearly one month on from the shortest day, the days are starting to get noticeably longer but as the saying goes so too is the cold getting stronger. There's fresh snow on Taranaki Maunga this morning. I think everyone is suffering from a surfeit of rain and along with the colder temperatures one of the best things to do in the garden now is, I think, just to sit down somewhere warm and review the jobs to be done before the growth cycle starts again.

Here in coastal Taranaki, that will not be too far away. Some of my roses are starting to shoot away and as I was pruning the hydrangeas last week it was easy to choose viable buds to cut back to as many were becoming active already.

Up at Pukeiti, the hydrangeas we were pruning last Wednesday are still very much dormant but the camellias and vireyas are putting on a lovely display and many temperate rhododendrons are starting to have the odd truss opening on them. The mega stars, those largeleaf rhododendrons, are just starting to flower. Down where 'Pukeiti' used to stand so proudly and magnificently, a plant that has grown from a branch that Keith Adams layered, is approaching full bloom. It was the first large-leaf rhododendron to flower in the garden this year. In 3 weeks, when we hold our soup and roll day, many more should also be looking lovely.

We have had two successful Sunday walks up at Pukeiti since the last newsletter. The first was led by Lynn Bublitz on the topic of epiphytes. In this walk Lynn showed us the plants he wrote about in the last newsletter and pointed out to us the features that enabled them to grow successfully perched in other forest plants. Ross, the gardener who is now responsible for the large-leafed area has since told us about several rimu plants he has found growing epiphytically in the bush. Rimu trees are not designed to be epiphytes but the birds aren't particularly careful about where they deposit the seeds they drop and some don't get through to the ground to grow from there. These accidental epiphytic rimu will eventually fall out of their host trees. Some may be lucky enough to land in a space where they can send their roots into the soil and continue to grow into large trees.

The second walk proved very popular with the public. About 80 people turned up to hear Rene Duncan talk about the medicinal uses of native plants. Rene started her programme in the Atrium where she talked about commonly used medicinal plants that were not, or at least not commonly, found at Pukeiti. We then moved out into the bush where Rene showed us how to identify each plant and talked about some of the conditions they could be used to relieve.

The Lodge working bee held on June 08 was so well attended that not only was Lynn able to establish a team of library volunteers to help with running the library, but we were also able to get the cutlery polished and some of the leather furniture in The Lodge cleaned and conditioned. Thanks to all the members who turned up to help.

The Wednesday Volunteers provided most of the labour for the Perennial Propagation Day but with the preparation that the garden staff had done for us we had the job more or less completed by 11:30am.

For the remainder of the year, we have events organised for members each month.

For some events we will request an RSVP. This is to help with organisation. If you don't RSVP but on the day realise you would like to attend then please feel free to do so, we'd love to see you up at Pukeiti.

A reminder again, not that most of us need it, that Covid is still in the community. All events continue to be organised with the caveat that whether they go ahead or not will be confirmed closer to the event. A final decision on each event will be made about 10 days beforehand. If it is cancelled, members will be notified by phone or email. Those without email can either check with another member or ring Heather (06 757 2460). If you have left your contact details with the person receiving the RSVP responses, we will easily be able to contact you. If the event proceeds, it will be held in accordance with any current Covid restrictions and all event venues will be well ventilated, so please dress accordingly. Most health experts are still recommending that you use a mask when inside. If you are at all unwell, have cold, hay fever or Covid symptoms we ask you, please, not to attend.

# Pukeiti 35 Years Ago

Sir Russell Matthews, the Trust's Patron died, and was succeeded by Mr Tom White who at the time was a Board Member.

1987 was a busy year around the Gatehouse and covered walkway.

Bill and Pat Campbell became the first managers of the café and souvenir shop in July, 8 months after the Gatehouse had been officially opened.

Over 60 sponsors enabled the new Gatehouse to open with elegant rimu chairs with green leather seats and smart rimu tables. Further sponsors for the few remaining tables and outdoor furniture were sought in the August newsletter.

The terraces between the drive and the Founder's Lawn were marked out and built and the steps from the drive into the Gatehouse were installed.

The area for the covered walkway was cleared of native forest, levelled and the retaining walls were built. Members of Rotary gave many volunteer hours building this and they also held fundraising events. Some of you may recall attending the Malvina Major concert in June organised by Rotary to raise money for the timber work in the covered walkway.

David and Pauline Brown resigned as staff to pursue kiwi fruit growing in the Bay of Plenty. Currently they are perhaps better known to members for their vireya nursery.

Kerry Daly was employed as a Labourer/Gardener and along with his wife and three small sons moved into the Cook Block House and Phillip Williams was appointed as Horticultural Officer.

Ron Gordon led a tour to China in April-May visiting Xian in Shaanxi province, Kunming, Dali, Cangshan Mountains, Yulong Mountain, and Lijiang in Yunnan province and Chengdu in Sichuan province.

# Access to The Lodge Kitchen

Currently the lock between the kitchen and The Atrium is not working. Adele is trying to get it fixed but it is taking time. If you are going up to Pukeiti and wish to use the kitchen you will need to enter through the back door which requires a different access code. If you wish to use this entrance to The Lodge, please ring one of the committee members before you go up to Pukeiti so they can inform you of the current code.

As a trial, this year the café will, on some occasions over spring, be using The Douglas Cook Room. On days when the café is so busy it can't seat all patrons, they will open this area to serve tea and coffee. When this happens members will not have exclusive use of this room and the kitchen. To compensate members, the café has agreed that they will give members, on presentation of a current membership card, a free cup of tea or coffee. The committee would be interested in hearing about your experiences with this trial arrangement.

# Membership Renewal

Members should now have received an email from the Board Secretary about the current work of the Pukeiti Rhododendron Trust, the many benefits of being a member of the Trust and information as to how to renew their membership if they are annual members. *R. macgregoriae* : Widespread in Papua New Guinea, it was introduced into New Zealand by Felix Jury. Other forms have been introduced since. The flowers are poisonous to livestock. People in the Western Highlands of New Guinea are recorded to have mixed them with sweet potato and used the mix to poison rats. **Flowering now at Pukeiti**
