Pukeiti's Golden Summer



The Lodge border

The gardens are well worth a visit despite it not being the season for rhododendrons to flower. The gardens and track walks are still most pleasurable.

Highlights at this time are the Keiller Garden, which in summer is at its colourful peak, and the replanted Lodge borders which are eye-catching. Both feature an array of perennials including Rudbeckia, Aster, Achillea, Sedum, Dahlia, Ageratum, Phlomis, Coreopsis and Helium to name a few. The tracks through the garden are lit by patches of hydrangeas.

While in the Vireya Walk, at this time of the year, it is the foliage, a tapestry of shapes and colours, which is the attraction. Only a few vireyas are in bloom, one of which is the white, large-flowered *R. konori*, its scent filling the surrounding space. Others such as 'Salmon Star' add colour along with a patch of red flowered *Scadoxus* (*Haemanthus*) katherinae. At the entrance to the walk a patch of *Lobelia aberdarica* is the focus for many of the

visitors who have come in a steady stream over the summer. The number has been enhanced by several bus loads from four cruise ships which have called into Port Taranaki. There is, too, an increasing number of family groups, some encouraged by the children's Explorers' Programme, arranged around the network of huts throughout the garden, with, of course, the chance of an overnight stay in the Pikopiko Rainforest Hut requiring an hour-long hike to reach. So popular is this bush hut that it is booked out until 2026.

Now school is back class groups are among the visitors. Recently two bus loads from Sacred Heart School, Stratford, spent three days participating in an environmental course run by the TRC.

It has been a dry summer, and the fine days have certainly encouraged visitors. Rain has fallen on only a few days and just 24 mm has been recorded for January, well below the usual. In the same month 70mm were recorded in Gisborne, reversing the normal 3:1 ratio. Ironic, as Douglas Cook had found it was too dry to grow rhododendrons at Eastwood Hill and convinced the New Zealand Rhododendron Association to establish a show garden in the Pukeiti rainforest. He bought the original tract of land and donated it to the Trust.

For 74 years the rainforest has been protected and conserved and within it the garden has been developed and nurtured. After a recent visit, Gordon Collier, our Patron, who was among the first of the volunteers to be enlisted (and sometimes dragooned!) by Russell Matthews, stated that, "Pukeiti is now as beautiful as I originally dreamed it might be."

The staff, under the guidance of Stuart Robertson, is key to this. Each one of the staff has a particular section for which they are responsible, and all come together when required and also help at Tupare and Hollard Gardens. Kristian Davies, the head gardener, outlined

some of the work done over the summer by his busy team:

- Cutting back bush margins and keeping open view shafts (particularly in the large-leaf area)
- Continuing with the usual summer jobs, weeding, dead heading rhododendrons and perennials, pruning spring flowering shrubs such as *Deutzia* and *Philadelphus*
- Leading guided walks and providing a mobility service
- Completing the Founders' Shelter and the new Hybrid Block
- Lookout with the laying of a concrete aggregate floor
- Staining and oiling the Lodge deck
- Repairing the brick walls behind the Lodge
- Appropriately nurturing and conserving the collections

The Trust continues to play its role by supporting the conservation of the rhododendron collection and financially backing the *ex-situ* project, and through the Plant Forum which meets every two

months with various members of the staff including Andrew Brooker TRC Collection and Project Officer, providing helpful recommendations and relaying the history of some of the acquisitions, which are then recorded on the plant data base. Trust Members of the Plant Forum include Graham Smith, Alan Jellyman, Peter Catt, Glyn Church and Lynn Bublitz.

An Axeman's Legacy

A 1950s' newspaper clipping included a story on the felling of a 26-year-old redwood at Tupare. A group of men were tasked with the job under the watchful eye of Russell Matthews. According to the story they were all original Pukeiti volunteers and included Allan Jordan, Fred Parker, Arthur Richardson, Pukeiti curator Rob Bailey, and axemen Archie and Ned Shewry. The redwood, the timber of which is considered one of the best, was felled with handsaws, not by axes, and later milled. Russell of course knew the reputation of the Shewry brothers, both champion axemen. Archie had won the 18-inch championship chop at the 1919 Auckland Exhibition, and Ned the world championship in both 1915 and 1921. Ned was also awarded a military medal for his World War 1 service.

The big man spent most of his life

felling native bush, becoming an ardent conversationist in his later years and developing a love for and deep interest in Pukeiti.

Despite his knowledge of trees, he was particularly keen on the smaller plants, like primula and polyanthus, and was given a small area in which to plant and nurture these. Years later, on this site, the first vireya glasshouse, funded by Stanley Smith, was built. This was later replaced by the Covered Walk, now superseded by the present extensive Vireya House.

When Ned died, he left to the Trust a parcel of land at Bell Block, which

was later sold, with the considerable proceeds being added to the Trust Fund. A grant from the Trust was later used to finance the Covered Walk, with Ned's original garden being remembered by a small plaque.

Tupare's redwoods trees have a place at Pukeiti too, as timber milled recently has been used as panelling in the ceiling of the Douglas Cook Room.
